Introduction

Nearly 700,000 children are abused each year

The Safe Environment for Every Kid (SEEK[™]) Model of Care aims to identify at-risk caregivers in an effort to prevent the occurrence of future child maltreatment

Children are at risk for maltreatment due to:

- Parental stress or depression
- Parental substance abuse
- Intimate partner violence
- Harsh punishment
- Food insecurity

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Purpose: implement and evaluate the effectiveness of a child maltreatment screening tool for an inpatient surgery service

Goals: 100% of pediatric surgical patients admitted to an acute care unit will be screened for child maltreatment via the SEEK[™] model, and each positive screen will receive a social work referral

Methods

Setting: 30-bed pediatric acute care unit within an urban, tertiary, academic medical center

Population: all pediatric surgical patients admitted to the acute care unit


Structure Measures: staff education, implementation of a formal child maltreatment screening tool


Process Measures: formal screening process via the Parent Questionnaire (PQ-R)

Outcome Measures: number of social work referrals Strategies & Tactics: education sessions, weekly data collection and dissemination, and weekly email reminders

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Conclusions

SEEK[™] Model of Care is associated with an increased number of social work referrals

Parental stress and/or depression and food insecurity were most identified risk factors

Resources provided by SW include food stamp and housing applications, food shelter locations, diapers, and transportation vouchers

Limitations

- Compliance affected by:
- Presence of project staff on the unit
- Presence of parents on the unit

Utilization of the SEEK[™] Model identifies at-risk children and families, who would otherwise go unnoticed.

Implications for Practice:

- Could be performed at pre-operative visit in outpatient setting
- Could be RN-implemented on inpatient floor as part of admission process

Future QI Projects:

- Other specialty clinics
- Main inpatient formal screening tool for inpatient pediatrics
